501(c)(3) Status: What Does It Mean for the Choir and for You?

So you've heard us announce that we've applied for 501(c)(3) status, and you may be wondering exactly what that means. What is 501(c)(3) status, and why is it important to us?

Obviously, the main benefit of which we are all aware is that now any donations people may want to make to the choir are tax deductible. There are also several other key benefits to having 501(c)(3) status that may be less well known but are equally important.

- Any income the choir earns will be tax exempt.
- Official recognition of our non-profit status makes our organization seem more credible to the public and other entities. We can clearly state our exempt status on all promotional materials and on any applications we fill out.
- Having official non-profit status makes us eligible for grants on federal, state and local levels. Most funders require an organization to have 501(c)(3) to be eligible to apply for a grant. They won't even consider an organization that is not registered as a 501(c)(3) entity. (We have received a certificate to show as proof of our status as our application has been approved by the IRS.)

- Being a 501(c)(3) qualifies the PPC for participation in literally hundreds of governmental programs operated by the Federal and State Governments.
- Having 501(c)(3) status makes us eligible for discount postage rates and special non-profit mailing privileges. The United States Postal Service gives nonprofits the option to take advantage of special bulk mailing rates which can in turn save the choir a lot of money.
- Many media outlets often give free or discounted rates for radio, TV announcements and press releases from nonprofit organizations. When planning to advertise an event or make a public service announcement, be sure to tell the outlet that we are a 501(c)(3).
- Many expenses we incur as part of our routine choir activities can be used as tax deductions: gas and mileage for rehearsals and concerts. We can deduct the cost of getting to and from St.

 David's (and Eugene). If you do not want to figure the exact cost of gas and oil used, you can calculate your deduction using the rate of 14 cents per mile driven. (IRS Standard Mileage Rates are subject change so be sure to check before you make a declaration.)
- Parking, lodging, taxis and Ubers used for choir-related activities are deductible expenses. Even the white clothing we need for concerts can be considered as uniforms or "costumes" and can be deducted as long as that particular outfit is relegated as such and not used for everyday wear.



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- Having a 501(c)(3) also provides lower membership rates to places like the Sam's Club or Costco. Plus, it's
 always a good idea to ask, when picking up supplies for the bake sale, for instance, if the purveyor honors
 non-profit rates.
- Once we get the PPC 501(c)(3) registered with Fred Meyers (it will take approximately 3 weeks), we encourage members, friends and family to sign into their accounts and link their Rewards Card. At the end of each quarter, Fred Meyer will make a donation to participating nonprofits based on the accumulated spending of the Rewards customers linked to each nonprofit. (More is more!) We'll let you know when this is active. Amazon also has a rewards program which we will sign up for and also encourage participation.
- In addition, other local businesses have employee matching grants for community non-profits. CVS, Starbucks, BestBuy, Kaiser Permanente, Verizon, Dick's Sporting Goods, Nike or Nordstrom will do a 1:1 matching grant for local non-profits. If you or a supportive relative are employed by any of these companies, please consider enrolling in a matching program.

Editor's Note: Mary T. received an email from the IRS on 12/31 saying our 501(c)(3) status is confirmed! We're official! Hooray!

Prof. Jones' Music Terms TM

Another installment in our continuing effort to demystify some of the arcane musical terms we encounter in our arrangements and at rehearsals ... this month we look at some rhythmic terms and notation.

Note Lengths: A whole note typically lasts for 4 beats; a half note is half as long (2 beats); a quarter note is half as long as a half note, etc. You can tell how long a note lasts by how it looks (see below).

Rests: For each note length there is a corresponding rest which indicates silence for a specific length of time: whole rest, half rest, quarter rest, etc.




Tied Notes: When two notes of the same pitch are "tied"

together, the two notes are combined into one longer sound, for instance, a half note tied to a quarter note lasts as long as three quarter notes.

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Dotted notes and rests: a dot after a note makes the note last 50% longer. For example, a dotted half note lasts as long as a half note + a quarter note (or 3 quarter notes). The same applies to rests.





Fermata: (not a type of cheese) This symbol indicates that the note (or chord) below it is to be held until you are directed to move on. It doesn't matter what the original length of the note was (quarter, half, whole, etc.), if you see this symbol above it, you hold it. If you see this symbol upside down it means the same thing, but applies to the note or chord above it.

The Story Behind the Song: About Those Muppets

While "Bein' Green" has since won praise as one of the most poignant and profound statements on racial and human differences ever recorded, the song grew out of a simple request by one of the show's producers: "We need a song for the frog." It was written by Joe Raposo in 1970, originally performed by Jim Henson as Kermit the Frog on both Sesame Street and The Muppet Show. When first recorded, the title of this song was only "Green".

In the Muppets version, Kermit begins by lamenting his green coloration, expressing that green "blends in with so many ordinary things" and wishing to be some other color. But by the end of the

song, Kermit recalls positive associations with the color green, and concludes by accepting and embracing his greenness. Since then, the melancholy ballad has been performed by Frank Sinatra, Diana Ross, Ray Charles, Tony Bennett, Andrew Bird and fellow pea-colored Muppet Oscar the Grouch. The song has been used to in promotions for Ellis Island, IBM, Lipton Tea and the US Immigration Service.

"Rainbow Connection" was written by songwriters Paul Williams and Kenny Ascher for *The Muppet Movie*, which came out in 1979. In the film, it is sung by Kermit The Frog as the Muppets set out to find adventure. In the *Music, Mayhem and More!* CD booklet, Williams briefly shared the creative process that surrounds "The Rainbow Connection" and the movie's finale, as follows:

"It's one of two favorite songs I've written in my life, and oddly, they're both from *The Muppet Movie*. (The other is 'I'm Going to Go Back There Someday.') When we started working on the film, Kenny and I and Jim and Jerry Juhl all agreed that we had to establish Kermit's soul from the very beginning. And to do that, he has to ponder some big questions. Kenny and I began to write this song -- the song addresses that inner voice that tells Kermit he can try to do these big things. Then Jerry Juhl did this great thing in the script at the end, when the stage explodes and the end of the rainbow appears — the actual 'rainbow connection.' That's the proof of the whole Muppet philosophy."

Williams later recalled "The amazing thing about the song is that it's a song about questions instead of answers... We start out with Kermit sitting in the swamp... We looked at it and said, well what has he got? He's got water, he's got air, he's got light. You have refraction, you have rainbows. So the first line came immediately."

If there's any song that doesn't have a malicious meaning hiding underneath, surely it's "Mahna Mahna," that innocent, happy song from the Muppets that doesn't have any words. Right?

Wrong.

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As it turns out, "Mahna Mahna" wasn't written by Jim Henson and it wasn't for the Muppets. Instead, the song was written by a man named Piero Umiliani for a film called *Heaven and Hell*, which is a documentary about the wild sex lives of Swedish women.

The original title of the song was "Viva la Sauna Svedese" ("Hooray for the Swedish Sauna"), and it was meant to accompany a group of Swedish nymphomaniacs jumping into the sauna. That really doesn't sound like something that Kermit the Frog would do.

But it's no accident that "Mahna Mahna" landed on the Muppets. The song was handpicked by Jim Henson, who seems to have known exactly where the song came from. ~tk

As a vagabond by choice, I've lived in all quadrants of the US. While it's not at all accurate, I claim Vermont as "home". My only son lives in Portland, and now do I.

With an almost abnormal appreciation for dogs, I anticipated going to veterinary school. However, as I am completely unable to do arithmetic, I tanked in the first quarter of pre-med math. The next step was to attend art school as no maths were required. I earned a BFA in Design and MFA in Design Theory which is a fancy way of saying "why do people buy what they buy".

I spent 22 years in the design field in my own firm (in Ohio) focusing on industrial and retail advertising. I've been in coal mines, steel foundries and every other sort of factory learning my clients. In those years, too, I achieved one of my art school goals, to design something people would actually remember. I did the original draft of one of the world's most recognizable, iconic, retail logos for which I receive absolutely no compensation. I designed, built and operated for 12 years, See Spot Run kennel in Jeffersonville, VT, the first community play kennel in the state. In those years as I watched my charges become fat and unhealthy, I became intrigued with the concept of health through diet as it seemed to be the only possible collective reason so many of my little friends were smelly, out-of-sorts and ill. I sought out and eventually mentored with, at the time, the crazy vets with strange ideas who are now Oprah's and Martha's personal vets and international veterinary superstars. Currently, I operate under the title of **LaudableDog**. Behavior, nutrition and common sense. I love what I do. (I work with cats, too.)

Bass Greg brought this event to our notice: an opportunity to experience Choir!Choir!Choir! first hand at the Aladdin Theater on January 20. Here's a little background on the project:

In 2011, Nobu Adilman and Daveed Goldman co-founded Choir! Choir! Choir!, a twice-weekly singing event with revolving participation from over 12,000 members that invites non-professional singers to belt out pop hits in venues across Toronto; no auditions or commitment required.

Blurring the lines of audience and artist, the choir has performed with punk legend Patti Smith, Tegan and Sara, Sloan, and Hey Rosetta!, and at major events such as TEDx Toronto and The Polaris Music Prize Gala. The choir has been featured in the Globe and Mail, Fast Company, and on NPR and CBC's The National. Adilman and Goldman now present the ideas behind the choir in inspiring interactive keynotes to audiences across North America.

The duo teach their three-part arrangement of a popular song to an audience divided by pitch, then lead a live performance of the song.

And, they'll be in Portland, at the Aladdin on January 20. Get your tickets (\$20), bring out PPC business cards (for recruiting) and let's go SING!
